

managed by the M.E.Church south. I also give and devise to said H.Addison Milton my interest in the household and kitchen furniture in the residence on said farm, and also my daughter Hattie's large picture and my large circular revolving dining table in my house at Bloomfield, Kentucky.

"Item 5:" I give and devise to my brother O.D.Humphrey my daughter Sallie's large picture.

"Item 6:" I give and devise to the M.E.Church south at Bloomfield, Kentucky the sum of One Thousand Dollars.

"Item 7:" I direct and devise that a monument be placed at the graves of myself and wife at a cost of One thousand dollars, if this has not already been done before my death.

"Item 8:" I hereby devise to my executors the sum of three hundred dollars to be used by them in caring for and protecting the graves of those members of the Humphrey family who are buried in the grave yard of the Old Poplar Flat Church near Woodlawn, Kentucky.

"Item 9:" I hereby will and devise to the Methodist Orphans Home at Louisville, Ky. which is maintained and managed by the M.E.Church south the sum of Two Hundred Dollars.

"Item 10:" I devise to the oldest member of the William M.Humphrey family bearing the Humphrey name, the family tree and secretary.

"Item 11" This item of said codicil is not copied herein because it simply names the property out of which my said husband wanted his just debts and funeral expenses paid. The foregoing items beginning with item three (3) are the same as those contained in the codicil to my said husband's said will and are adopted as a part of this codicil to my will and when complied with once are satisfied as to both wills and a voucher showing that any one of said items has been paid and satisfied during my lifetime will be a full satisfaction of said items in both wills.

"Item 12" Should there be a residue or surplus of property after said items are paid off and satisfied, then, it is my will that same be converted into money, and that all my personal property be converted into money, and the sum realized from both be divided as follows, viz: To the said H.Addison Milton one half thereof, and the other one-half to the brothers and sisters of my said husband, and the descendants of any that may be dead per stirpes.

"Item 13" I hereby appoint my said cousin, H.Addison Milton, and Hubert L.Humphrey as Executors of this my last will and testament.

This Codicil is not to be construed to affect in any way the real estate devised by item two of my original will which I dated January 15th, 1905.

Item 1, Should it be necessary in order for my executors to settle up my estate for any or all of my real estate to be sold I hereby give them full power to sell and convey same with fee simple title.

This codicil consists of this and two other typewritten pages and my name is written on the margin of each of the other two pages.

A writing purporting to be the last will and testament and codicil of Elizabeth Humphrey late of Nelson County, Kentucky, was this day produced in open Court and the same was proven by the oaths of the following persons; viz; John S.Kelley, one of the attesting witnesses to said will, who also stated that he is now blind and unable to see said writing and signatures; that he remembered testatrix being at his office in regard to making the will; that Redford C.Cherry the other attesting witness to said will is now dead, and the genuineness of the signature of Elizabeth Humphrey to said will was proven by the oath of J.A.Hinkle, one of the attesting witnesses to said codicil, who stated that he was familiar with the signature of said Elizabeth Humphrey by having seen her write it, and that the signature to said will was the signature of Elizabeth Humphrey that she died a few days ago a resident of Nelson County Ky and was 68 years old when she died, that she was of sound mind at the time of signing said will and codicil; and who also proved the attestation and signature of J.J.Wakefield, the other subscribing witness to said codicil; that testatrix subscribed her name to said codicil in their presence and that they subscribed their name as witnesses in her presence and at her request; and the genuineness of the signature of Redford C.Cherry and John S.Kelley attesting witnesses to said will was proven by the oaths of Victor L.Kelley and Morgan Yewell, each of whom stated that he was familiar with the signatures of each of said attesting witnesses by having seen each of them sign their names and that the signature to said will as witnesses were the signatures of Redford C. Cherry and John S.Kelley Wherefore it was adjudged by the Court that said writings are and that they be recorded as the last will and testament of the said Elizabeth Humphrey which is now done.
